APRIL SESSION APRIL 7, 2015

Regular Session of the Board of County Commissioners for the County of St. Joseph, State of Michigan, was held in the Commissioners' Room, Courthouse at the Village of Centreville, Michigan on April 7, 2015, at 5:00 p.m.

Chairman Dobberteen called the meeting to order.

The Invocation was given by Commissioner Shaffer.

The Pledge to the American Flag was given.

The Clerk, Pattie S. Bender, called the roll and the following Commissioners were present:

AGENDA

Mr. Yoder asked that authorization to move forward to a settlement of a FOIA issue at the Sheriff's Department be added to the agenda.

It was moved by Commissioner Balog and supported by Commissioner Baker that the agenda be approved as amended. Motion carried.

CITIZEN COMMENT

Loralee Knepper, M-60, Mendon stated that she had read that there may be a dog park within Meyer-Broadway Park and she encouraged this concept to move forward. She has been to one in Kalamazoo and it is very successful.

2015 EQUALIZATION REPORT

Tony Meyaard, Equalization Director, stated that there will be no factors in any unit this year. There is an overall increase of \$108,665,000 which is 4.3% over 2014. The Taxable Value is up \$53,700,000 or 2.82% which is higher than he had projected.

They caught a mistake during the audit and there was a 10 million dollar mistake in one township regarding the Enbridge pipeline and they were allowed to correct those figures.

The highest increase was in Flowerfield Township with 15.31% and the only decrease was in Leonidas Township which was .02%.

Commissioner Eaton asked if he had comparison figures of St. Joseph County compared to other counties in the State.

Mr. Meyaard responded by saying that there is a group of Southwest Michigan Equalization Directors and all Counties have increased in a similar percentage.

Commissioner Eaton asked Mr. Meyaard if he could give a 3 year projection for St. Joseph County for planning purposes. Mr. Meyaard stated that he would work on this idea. He did say that personal property taxes are gradually going away according to several different formulas in fairly recent amendments to laws and by 2023 all will be gone except for utilities.

DOG PARK

Commissioner Shaffer stated that at the last Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting they were presented with a proposal to have a 7.5 acre dog park within the Meyer-Broadway Park. There will be a chain linked fence enclosing the area. The cost is about \$7,000. The Parks and Recreation Commission adopted this proposal recommending that it move forward to the County Commission.

Mr. Yoder stated that he had met with Parks Director Jaymes MacDonald this morning and he saved \$12,000 on a previous project therefore there are funds available for the Dog Park.

It was moved by Commissioner Shaffer and supported by Commissioner Baker that the Parks Director move forward to provide a Dog Park at Meyer Broadway Park.

Commissioner Balog stated that he was involved with a Rotary project in Oshtemo to build a dog park and he believes that this is an excellent idea to build one at Meyer Broadway.

Motion carried.

CITIZENS' COMMENTS

Becky Shank, Constantine, thinks that the Dog Park is a great idea and suggested that rules be posted at the park, one of them being that the dogs must be immunized among others.

Mr. Hartwick thanked the Board of Commissioners for the opportunity to be here almost 9 years as G.I.S. Director. He stated that it has been a great experience for him.

Chairman Dobberteen thanked Mr. Hartwick for taking the Department to the next level.

Mr. Hartwick introduced Ken Syers, Jr., who will be taking his place. Mr. Syers stated that he is looking forward to this position and is honored to take over a program that Mr. Hartwick has built.

COMMISSIONER COMMENT

Commissioner Shaffer stated that the County years ago saw the value of creating the Land Resource Centre which began under the direction of Mark Clute and he thanked Mr. Hartwick for continuing to grow the department and he welcomed Ken Syers as the new director.
